SEWAGE MAKES LIFE MISERABLE

Hoedspruit residents say they have been struggling with overflowing sewage for the last two years with nothing being done to address it.

A resident in Raptor's View Wildlife Estate told the Herald that the stench in the estate is unbearable.

"We cannot breathe. We have lived here for four years, and this is the worst it's been. I must have burned a thousand candles to get some relief from the stench."

She said photos she took of the overflow show that the pipes might be damaged.

"The generator also did not kick in this whole weekend with load-shedding."

James Cary, manager of Raptors View, said residents are severely affected by the spillage of sewage.

"It has been ongoing for a long time. When it overflows, it pushes up and flows in to the estate and Southern Cross Schools

"It is hard to breathe, and it also attracts

mosquitos," he said. He said a dam on the estate is also filled

"We were told that there was a faulty cable and it would be repaired on Thursday, September 7.

"I passed there around 12:00 but I did not notice any work being done and the sewage was still overflowing," he said.

In July, the Herald reported on the

Democratic Alliance (DA) lodging a complaint to the South African Human Rights Commission (SAHRC) over a large sewage spill near the LeBamba fruit and vegetable supermarket in Ward 1.

The DA said that despite numerous oversight visits and complaints to the technical department of the Mopani District Municipality (MDM), no feedback was received and residents and businesses in the area had to deal with the sewage overflowing for more than five months.

"The continuous flow of sewage has caused an unbearable stench and is impacting businesses in the area negatively. The sewage spill further poses a serious health risk," Christine Du Preez, DA Ward 1 councillor said at the time.

MDM is the water authority in the district and is responsible for the maintenance and management of the sewage system in Hoedspruit. "It is failing dismally to fulfill its responsibility," she said.



No progress on water project after 6 years

The Mopani District Municipality (MDM) has been reported to the Human Rights Commission (HRC) by the Freedom Front (FF Plus) for not completing the Kampersrus water supply project.

The FF Plus' councillor in the Maruleng Local Municipality (MLM), Pieter Gerber, has filed a complaint with the HRC after the promised that the Kampersrus water supply project would be completed by June.

He said the project fell through the cracks, even after they met with the mayor of MLM, Tsheko Musolwa, on May 3 to find a way forward.

"In 2010, a large-scale sewage treatment plant and water supply project, the Kampersrus water supply and sewage scheme, was started. Since 2017, the project has been indicated as 98% complete in reports, but the right size transformer has been lacking. During a community meeting in May this year, the mayor and Paradise Shilowa, director for water services at the MDM, informed residents that the installation of the transformer would take place by June. On August 23, a community meeting was organised again

where representatives of the MDM shone in their absence and the mayor could not provide answers," said Gerber.

Meanwhile, the community of Kampersrus has been without water for days.

"The FF Plus requests the HRC to ensure that the project is completed so that the communities of Kampersrus and Schocia can get their basic right to water, as well as a working sewage treatment plant.

"MDM must now be called to account for the violation of residents' basic right to sufficient water and a clean environment to live in," he added.

On their Facebook page, MLM addressed the issues raised at the meeting in Kampersrus.

"In this meeting, it was confirmed by Gerber that

the borehole which was not operational had been fixed and there are now two boreholes which (are) functional and as such the water challenges are very minimal. With regard to the supply of bulk water it was clarified and confirmed that for the current financial year 2023/24, MDM budgeted R19m to address the water challenges on a permanent basis," it said.

The mayor further indicated that the Kampersrus Community Hall and the speed humps, among other issues, will be finalised soon as they are waiting for the financial year to commence in July.

Regarding the delay in the construction of the Kampersrus internal road, MDM said that the delay was due to permission needed for indigenous to be removed.

"The project will be finalised as soon as the trees are removed and (we are) looking forward to extending it to the Mariepskop Primary School road as per the 2023/24 municipal budget," said the mayor in the Facebook post.

Herald contacted MDM spokesperson, Odas Ngobeni, with regards to the water project.

At the time of going to print, a response was not received. An update will be published once MDM responds.





Emily nearly ready to return to the wild

Emily, a pangolin rescued from the illegal wildlife trade, is slowly recovering from her horrific injuries inflicted by her capturers.

Scales Pangolin Rescue Fund said that upon arrival Emily was unable to walk properly and was aimlessly stumbling around.

"We knew there was something serious wrong and from her melted scales, we knew that she must have been through immense trauma. But nothing could have prepared our team for what we would learn from the CT scan that was ordered in desperation to find out why she refused to feed. She had seven broken ribs with hemorrhaging in a small portion of her lung and a broken tail," said Amy Clark of Scales Pangolin Rescue Fund in a post on Facebook.

She said despite conflicting

opinions and pessimistic, yet realistic, views on her prognosis, their team persevered.

"Emily has surprised us all with her tenacity and will to live.

"It took nine gruelling days of our veterinarian trying everything accompanied by lots of tears for her to feed for the very first time on her own. It took a further three days for her to properly start to feed and forage."

She said Emily has not only recovered from her injuries thanks to the love and care of their teams but also gained back her body weight.

"She is nearly ready to begin her first stage of release in a secure undisclosed wildlife area."

She thanked Umoya Khulula Wildlife Centre, Provet Animal Hospital, Rhino Revolution and Anna's Emergency Wildlife Rescue Fund for the help in Emily's recovery.

Hitchhikers robbed by motorists giving them lifts

The police have warned citizens against hitchhiking after an alarming increase in the number of hitchhiking crimes reported throughout Limpopo in recent weeks.

According to Sgt Maurice Nkhwashu, spokesperson for the police in Tzaneen, victims are robbed of their personal belongings and money by motorists giving them lifts.

In the last weekend of August, there were 18 cases in the province reported within 72 hours.

"In Tzaneen hardly a week goes by without a person reporting that they were robbed when they were given a lift," he said.

According to him, most of the crimes occur on the R71 road, either travelling to and from Tzaneen, Polokwane, Giyani, Hoedspruit, or Phalaborwa.

He said it is believed that syndicates are responsible for the crimes. They are believed to have people at different hiking spots identifying potential victims.

"These people usually approach the unsuspecting hitchhikers, asking them where they are going and try to find out if they have any valuable items and money with them.

"The syndicates have

developed new ways of robbing people; they now have electronic card vendor machines where they force their victims to make payments into their accounts.

"One victim was forced to apply for a loan for over R100 000 which was approved immediately and paid into the suspect's account. At times the victims are stripped of their clothes."

The vehicles reported to the police are Polos (white, blue, and silver), a BMW, a Honda hatchback, a white Corolla, and an Audi.

Nkhwashu advised commuters to rather use public transport.

Unicorn Preparatory School in Tzaneen on Wednesday, August 30 switched to solar energy while on load-shedding.

Ian Houston, the headmaster of Unicorn Preparatory School, expressed his delight during the 'switch-on' ceremony.

The infrastructure committee (a subcommittee of the board of governors) did extensive research under the guidance and expertise of an engineering consultant, Rob Allen. "My children went to Unicorn Preparatory School, so I have a long association with the school. When the board approached me for my opinion on switching to solar energy, I knew it was a good idea and was extremely excited to get involved on a pro bono basis.

"Initial research was done on how many solar panels and batteries would be needed and then we designed a model to meet those needs," said Allen.

The headmaster and the school are grateful to Allen for the time and effort he put into getting this project

off the ground and to fruition.

This is one of the many projects that Allen has assisted the school with, and Unicorn Preparatory School would not have the infrastructure it does today without his assistance. The 'switch-on' was attended by members of the Unicorn Preparatory School's management team, members of the board of governors, and Allen and his solar specialists who worked tirelessly behind the scenes. Unicorn Preparatory School is one of the first schools in Limpopo to have started to go off the grid.

Siblings turn snares into jewelery

A brother and sister duo are transforming snares recovered from poaching activities into handmade jewelery.

Lilly and Troy Otto, founders of Down To The Wire, say they grew up in the Lowveld and are passionate about conservation.

"Four years ago, Troy came up with the idea of spreading awareness on poaching by transforming materials used to kill in a way to save wildlife.

We rework snares into handcrafted jewelry and other items. The funds generated from sales of these items go towards the treatment costs to rescue and save animals affected by snares," said Lilly.

She said that there are many anti-poaching units and private reserve teams that spend endless hours out in the bush removing snares from wildlife areas.

"These teams generously donate the snares to Down To The Wire as they serve no other

purpose once removed from the bush.' She said their creations can be worn as a symbol of hope.

"Bracelets, necklaces, earrings, bookmarks, and keychains are a few examples of what we create. We also create custom pieces based on a client's needs."

She said they have a skilled production team and have gained a lot of experience over the past four years.

"Our motto for working with wire is when at first you don't succeed, try again," she said.

"We believe that no matter the animal's endangered status or size, every animal deserves a second chance.

"It is our contribution in finding alternative ways to turn what once was so destructive into hope," she said

"Funds raised are made available to a select group of wildlife veterinarians who have dedicated their lives to making a difference within wildlife conservation, to cover costs of treatment and rehabilitation," concluded Lilly.
